

Preface

One thing discovered while researching for this document is that Starfleet Command has been represented in print, multiple ways throughout Fandom for 50 years.

In the early years, the organization operated under different titles such as Starfleet Central, Starfleet Headquarters, Starfleet Command, Star Fleet Command and at times, simply Starfleet. Reorganizations in the early years brought everything under one banner, Starfleet Command. The one thing that has not changed is the roots from which we grew, in that we are still a family - fan friendly, fan run organization.

We've been fortunate in that we have been able to overcome the power-lust of position, and the greed of the more business structured organizations and fan clubs. 50 years later, we maintain a fan friendly atmosphere, run by volunteers. These members give freely of their time and experience to keep the organization strong and viable. Our members are the true heroes in our history.

Throughout the decades some things have changed, while others have remained the same. The title of the organization's newsletter would be one example of this.

'Starfleet Communications' was the title given in 1974 and remains as such today. (with copyright) The bi-laws governing the actions of the organization would be another. Still aptly titled the "Articles of Federation", (with copyright) but evolved and evolving to keep the organization going forward. Surprisingly, much of the same verbiage in the original document is still applies in today's updated version.

As you view the enclosed material, we hope you will keep in mind that some of these documents are up to 50 years old. Some were typed on typewriters and the best we can get for a digital copy is a picture or a scan.

Fun Fact

In 1964, the pilot episode of Star Trek, 'The Cage' was completed. The stars included Jeffrey Hunter as Captain Christopher Pike, Majel Barrett in the position of Number One and Leonard Nimoy, in the role as Spock. NBC rejected the pilot under the guise of being too cerebral, among other items. A second pilot episode was requested and became 'Where No Man Has Gone Before'.

After the second pilot received a more favorable response from NBC, Star Trek aired its first episode 'The Man Trap' on September 8th, 1966. Star Trek the original series aired on television between 1966 and 1969, and featured 79 episodes.

U.S.S. Enterprise

The USS Enterprise was formed in Lufkin Texas and launched in 1973. It began as 12 members, with teenagers John Bradbury and Jay Wallace leading the group.

Word spread quickly and in just a few short months, other individuals and groups were asking to join and begin their own chapters. The club surged to 50+ members.

Corrections on STARFLEET ORGANIZATION!

Corrections on STARFLEET ORGANIZATION:

Officers must come to meetings and work on Starfleet Activities in their city or county, and are required to participate in all major policy decisions of their starship, whether in person, by phone, or by mail.

Commands are no longer limited to counties. Regions of states are now used. The first member in a region (outlined by Starfleet Command) will be placed in command of the ship of his (or her) choice if he recruits a minimum of ten new members. They need not be from that region.

The address for the USS Enterprise has been changed. Captain Belinda McCall is now in command of it. A new Starfleet division, Canopus 3, is yet to reach full Starship status and is commanded by Lieutenant Andy McCorkle. It serves the state of Ohio. The addresses are:

MEETINGS

The highest ranking officer in a city or county is permitted to call neetings. The officers set the time and place and is responsible for notifying all personnel in his city or county. Because of widespread membership, a personal neeting such as this of an entire starship would be almost impossible. Discussion topics could be published in the starship's newsletter, all member of the starship send their comments on the topics back to the starship commander, and then a summary of the comments is published in the next newsletter, thus achieving the same purpose. Key topics could be introduced in each newsletter and members could contribute topics. Additional suggestions are welcome and needed.

MEMBERSHIP CARDS

Starfleet membership cards are being improved. They are called Starfleet Identity Cards. They are color-coded as to section (green, Command; blue, Science; red, Engineering/Ship's Services). Starfleet Command fills in the information and sends the card to the member. The member should sign it, have his commanding officer sign it (the c.o. may get it first, sign it, and give it to the member), and then put his right thumbprint in the space provided (using ink). Then he should send the card back to Starfleet Command, along with a recent photo of himself. Starfleet Command will put the photo on and spray the card with plastic. Then is will be sent to the member. It may be two months before we start getting the cards to you, so please be patient.

The ship was the Excalibur, and plans were made to hold a convention, ExcaliCon, in fall of 1976, but those plans never came to fruition. room where the meetings were held in 1975 is now an office. The USS Excalibur NCC 1705 decommissioned sometime after the year 1999. After the success of Star Wars in 1977, the club became the Association of Science Fiction and Fantasy. In the late 1980s, it merged with Quark, the less-fannish group, to become Quark: the Association of Science Fiction and Fantasy. Through fits and starts, Quark remains on campus and has been one of the largest clubs at BYU

In 1976, the organization boasted 400+ members and a number of chapters had been established around the U.S. Annual membership was \$3.00.

In the next couple of years, the organization operated under different titles such as Starfleet Central, Starfleet Headquarters, Starfleet Command, Star-Fleet Command and at times, simply Starfleet.

One of Admiral Bradbury's last acts as Chief of Staff was to expand **Starfleet** through the creation of ten new staff positions.

In the fall of 1977, Admiral Bradbury retired from active duty in the organization, to enter college. He passed the leadership of the club to Adeline Longshaw.

Mr. Bradbury went on to attend Texas A&M University from 1978 to 1982, earning a Bachelor of Science degree and graduating Summa Cum Laude. He continued his education at the University of Houston-Clear Lake from 1983 to 1987 and earned a Master of Science degree.

His professional life has consisted of multiple projects, working with NASA in 'Human Exploration and Operations', the 'Space Shuttle' programs, the 'International Space Station' and with Lockheed Martin Space Mission Systems and Services. Mr. Bradbury was last reported as retired and enjoying life in Florida.

Adeline Longshaw


In 1978, the second person stepping into the position of Chief of Staff/Fleet Commander, was 47-year-old Adeline Longshaw. Also credited as the first mature adult to chair the organization. She resided in San Diego CA., during the term of her command, which placed Starfleet Command head-quarters in California.

Since Admiral Bradbury had expanded **Starfleet**, through the creation of ten new staff positions, including Chief of Communications, Chief of Operations, Chief of Fleet Recruiting, and Chief of Personnel, it fell to Admiral Longshaw to help fill these positions when she began her term. She brought everything under one title and gave the organization more of a military structure as well as adding some new positions, including Chief of Logistics.

Membership continued to grow, with four hundred thirty-one members and eighteen starships by the end of 1978. Membership dues increased to \$4.00 for new members, with renewals remaining \$3.00.

"The organization began another rapid expansion as a fan club in 1979. A formal Organizational Chart was put into place reflecting actual military structure to allow the club to function more efficiently and departments were standardized. Starfleet Central referred to the office of Chief of Staff, Starfleet Headquarters referred to the Admiralty Board members and their staff and the overall organization was referred to as Starfleet Command." (Don Dailey)

All chapter COs sent their reports to the Command Assistance Committee (CAC), headed by Brandt Heatherington. The CAC also served as a place

ADMIRAL'S LOG

After a long hiatus, I have several important statements to make. First, a mighty cheer to John Bradbury who founded the club which grew to become Starfleet. Two years ago, he had serious doubts about continuing the organization. All the records were backlogged because of his personal commitments and schedule. I volunteered to take over with the resolve that I would work to my utmost to keep Starfleet a viable organization.

Several months ago, a number of events happened which seriously affected that resolve. I suffered a disabling condition, which, fortunately, has left only minor residual effects. My oldest daughter escaped death by the slimmest of cobwebs. After heroic surgery to save her, she required intensive nursing care. Another relative, a six year old girl, suffered a near fatal attack from a syndrome which will require life-long medication. Then my ex-husband died suddenly from a heart attack, with resultant trauma to all my children. I have not recited all this to elicit sympathy, but rather as a means for your understanding why Starfleet was very low on my priorities. I was really operating with one oar out of water. But, some real good has come out of all this.

Both my troubles and John Bradbury's have pointed up a serious flaw in the set-up of Starfleet. When the inability of one member to function at normal capacity disables the indicates organization, it overentire centralization. Thanks to the gargantuan efforts of John Wetsch and Brandt Heatherington, along with an able assist from John Lunt and the many who volunteered their help, Starfleet organization has undergone a complete overhaul. This should keep Starfleet viable and functioning, no matter who "goes under".

Many thanks to all of you who have stuck with us through the good times and the bad. With the advent of Star Trek-The Motion Picture, I know our ranks will swell and We will continue to be the biggest and the best.

'Starfleet Communications' moved to a legalsized format since more information could be included at a lower cost. It continued to have dozens of articles on Star Trek (including information on Star Trek: The Motion Picture) and started to include graphics for the first time.

Dear Friends,

Attached are the most recent STAR TREK newsletters from Paramount. Please accept apologies for my own delay in bringing you up to date on STAR TREK - THE MOTION PICTURE, but I am sure you understand that every hour and ounce of available energy has had to be spent on the film project itself.

No one can make a science fiction movie of this size without meeting more than one crisis, and we've had our share, On the other hand, the film is looking very good, and my enthusiasm is rising as I see more and more of the picture coming together. It has seemed nip and tuck whether all of our opticals could be delivered on schedule, but it appears now that all the essential ones will be completed on time.

Certainly, it is comforting to know that talents like Robert Wise, Doug Trumbull and John Dykstra are fighting to meet our schedules.

The STAR TREK film premiere is going to require some understanding from very special fans and friends like yourself. Those receiving this letter deserve to be invited to the premiere far more than many of the people who will actually attend. It will premiere in Washington D.C. on

December 6th as a benefit performance for the National Space Club and with the cooperation of the Smithsonian Institution -— a fairly small theatre with limited seating capacity. If this were the "best of all possible worlds" the STAR TREK premiere would be a gigantic fan event.

I would have much preferred to do it that way. On the other hand, it does seem to say something for STAR TREK and its fans that notables in science, government and art are publicly acknowledging our show in the nation's capital this way.

For those of you who have inquired, I have completed the novelization of STAR TREK — THE MOTION PICTURE, and the book will appear in book stores on December 1st. Doing my first STAR TREK novel was one of the most pleasant labors since the writing of the first pilot script. Meanwhile, the hardcover book titled THE MAKING OF STAR TREK - THE MOTION PICTURE has been completed and will be published in February. It was written and researched by Susan Sackett, who had access to everyone from director to janitor during the making of the film, and

who has done a splendid job of researching and writing the inside story of how our film was made.

"We are doing our best to make STAR TREK — THE MOTION PICTURE something near what you wanted. we are also trying very hard to make it even a little more wherever possible.

She was actively involved in many civic and community organizations including the Hickory County Community Foundation, the Tri-County Literacy Coalition, the Good Neighbor Club, the HCFRW, NARFE, PTA, Cub Scouts, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Garden Club, Mensa, Red Hat Society, and many others. She loved gardening and was known for her special life-like scarecrow characters. She loved doing things with her family such as camping, games, and story-telling. Every year her kids, grandkids, and other kids of all ages would gather in her kitchen to build gingerbread houses with her. She loved participating in the Christmas parades and was an awesome Mrs. Claus. She really enjoyed dressing up and acting silly from tea parties with her granddaughters to acting on stage in community productions. She was known as the Story Lady to local kindergarteners and 1st graders. She was the family historian and genealogy expert.



1981 - 1986

John Wetsch

John Wetsch was a high school student from Killdeer North Dakota, when he joined Starfleet Command in 1976. He served in many positions, including the Starfleet Command Academy. While there, he produced the first "Starfleet Command Academy Training Manual". First editions are very difficult to come by. It was popular enough that it was reprinted as second edition, some of which can still be found for sale on eBay.



In 1979, 20-year-old college student John Wetsch, the Chief of Operations with the rank of Admiral, received a call from Fleet Admiral Adeline Longshaw, requesting he take command of SFC. At the time, the Chief of Personnel was Brandt Heatherington, who was in High School and lived in Alexandria, Virginia. During Fleet Admiral Wetsch's term, SFC headquarters moved to North Dakota where it would remain for the next six years.

"I was about 20 at the time I received the call from Admiral Longshaw to take the reins. I do not remember the exact date but I do remember the event itself well and maybe I will find a record to confirm the actual date. I was a College student. Prior to becoming Chief of Staff I was Chief of Operations. Our Chief of Personnel was Brandt Heatherington who was in High School and lived in Alexandria, Virginia at the time. We had a lot of things to pull together when Adm Longshaw stepped down and had some failures and successes in this regard. I think the biggest thing was that we persevered as it would have been easy enough to close up shop at that time but we didn't want to lose the organization and had a strong belief in the ideals."

Our biggest issue at the time began with trying to make sure memberships were getting processed. I inherited a bit of a mess there. There were people who had applied for membership, not getting anything and rightfully complaining. I was not aware of how bad this was and only thinking we had a solvable backlog. From the complaints though, even The Star Trek Welcommittee took the step to blacklist SFC (Note: We have outlived the STW organization). It took a while to get needed records, for us to get reorganized, and address some other matters as everything was done by either snail mail or long distance phone calls that we couldn't afford. There was of course the money issue and we were not given the treasury and money was coming out of our pockets to try and get this done (I believe Brandt felt more of the brunt on this that I did)."

"My only regret on all of this was that as we were making good progress and moving in the right direction I appointed a new Chief of Personnel (after Brandt stepped down) who had some very good ideas. That was from Oregon and who was a ship captain. So, as things appeared to be coming together and we formed a 3-way command structure of Adm. John Lunt (Texas) as Chief of Operations, promoted Stillwell (Oregon) to the Admiralty as Chief of Personnel, and myself (North Dakota) as Chief of Staff.

But to the surprise and dismay of most of us working on these issues was that one person went out on his own and tried to dissolve Starfleet Command and created the Starfleet organization using the SFC personnel roster provided to him for the COP role. I formally removed him from Starfleet Command but the damage was done and our organization was split. The saving grace was that we still had many loyal SFC leaders on ships and outposts who understood that SFC was the original organization and wanted to stay with it. I do find it somewhat interesting on the revisionist history of the early days of the organization posted by the Starfleet (not SFC) organization when they discuss my Admiralty.

Although our numbers dropped considerably we remained a viable organization. The events that occurred lead me to form a new Admiralty Board structure with members who wanted to help the organization grow, create the Articles of Federation to serve as the constitution and by-laws of the organization, and get our remaining outpost and ship operations units to recruit and remain active. Not to mention needed communications with the newsletter and other stuff. Overall, this took years to get the organization back on track. But this was accomplished and the completion of our Articles of Federation allowed us to apply and get our 501(c) tax exempt status.

"By the time all of the dust settled I had gotten married, we had 2 daughters at the time, and I was starting on my career. I decided I had accomplished what I needed to do to keep SFC alive and viable and made the decision to step down as Chief of Staff. It was time for others to take over leadership and progress the organization further. Also, prior to this I was very fortunate to get the USS Farragut started again in North Dakota and they developed into a very good and active starship at the time. I passed the torch to Don Day and with the change in leadership Indianapolis became the new epicenter for SFC."

HISTORY OF STARFLEET COMMAND 1974 -(October) A group of Star Trek fans in a little town, (Lufkin, Texas) went national/international under Fleet Admiral John Bradbury. In the first few years the group operated under various titles depending upon who was writing the letters. At different times the group was referred to as "Starfleet Central", "Starfleet Headquarters", "Starfleet Command", "Star Fleet Command", and sometimes just "Starfleet" 1977 - FADM Bradbury stepped down and was replaced by FADM Adeline Longshaw. Under FADM Longshaw, many things became more standardized. Specifically, "Starfleet Central" referred to the Office of the Chief of Staff (senior officer in the fleet), "Starfleet Headquarters" referred to the other Admiralty Board members and their support staff, and the overall organization became "Starfleet Command". 1980 - FADM Longshaw stepped down in late 1979 and FADM John Wetsch became the new Chief of Staff on January 1,1980 1981 - VADM Eric Stillwell, Vice Chief of Personnel, declares himself Fleet Admiral and places himself in the position of "Commanding Admiral." After refusing to return membership rosters to FADM Wetsch, VADM Stillwell was ejected from Starfleet Command with the support of the Admiralty Board 1986 - FADM Wetsch is elected to the Chief of Staff position. 1987 - FADM Wetsch resigned and FADM Don Dailey became the new Chief of Staff. 1990 - FADM Dailey is elected to the Chief of Staff position. This term formally began on January 1, 1991. 1994 - FADM Rita Cawthon-Clark is elected to the Chief of Staff position. Her term began on January 1, 1995. 1996 - FADM Cawthon-Clark resigns in August, 1996 and is replaced by FADM Wayne Chang. The Chief of Staff position is renamed "Commander-In-Chief," the Chief of Staff position is changed to handle only the Command Staff Support and is filled by VADM Paul Sundstrom, the Chief of Personnel position is brought back to be part of the Admiralty

SFC Helps National Kidney Foundation






Banking for the organization was changed to a new venue and became 5th Third Bank, where it remains as of this publication.



Starfleet Command started in 1974. From its beginnings in North America, it has spread into several continents including Europe, Australia, & Asia. The worldwide headquarters still resides in the United States. The top position is known as the Commander-In-Chief. Each of the Quadrants is administered by a group of officers known as the Admiralty Board. They are responsible to see that memberships are processed, newsletters published, awards are given out and policy is explained. Regional headquarters known as Starbases provide a liaison between the local ships and the Admiralty Board. The organization is patterned after Star Trek in any of its various forms. Since the show spans a wide range of time, slight alterations are needed to maintain consistency. The local units are led by a senior officer known as the commanding officer. The members of each unit can choose from a variety of areas including Communications, Engineering, Medical, Operations, Science, Security, Marines or Search & Rescue. They need not have actual experience in these areas but if hey want to choose an area that they have experience in, that is also possible. The organization has a rank structure but this is mostly to facilitate the passing of information from the unit level to the Starbase level to the Admiralty Board level. The main purpose is to offer people the opportunity to meet together with common interests. Starfleet Command is a social club based on Star Trek so it takes on the appearance of a military organization without the rigidity normally ssociated with the military
